With talk of a new Royals Stadium opening around 2028 on the Kansas side of the city and two consecutive years of playing .500 plus baseball, there was a lot for fans to chirp about. A winning record was attained and held through June 10th, lost, and then regained in late September to coincide with a third place, seven-game deficit in the AL Central Division. Bubbling around .500 most of the season, the Royals star began to shine brightly helping to put behind three 100 plus loss seasons since their last World Championship in 2015 and post-season appearance in 2024. An 8-18 June swoon was followed by a perky 15-9 to get the ball club back on track. Even second place belonged to Kansas City from August 19th through September 6th...Offensively, the team enjoyed a highly productive year. Most Valuable Player candidate, Bobby Witt Jr., was number one in the big leagues in doubles (47) and base hits (184). He finished with 88 RBI and 23 jacks while wielding one of the best gloves at shortstop anywhere. His slash was .351/.501/.852. Vinnie Pasquantino made a lot of noise with his 33 home runs and 113 RBI. Salvador Perez, splitting time between catcher, designated hitter, and first base, tallied 30 homers and 100 RBI. Witt Jr. also swiped 38 bases at an 81 percent success rate...The six prime starters combined for 45 wins. Michael Wacha rang up the most with 10. Carlos Estevez was the King of the Closers in the majors.
