Welcome to the world of Cal Raleigh, the Mariner who seemed to hit a home run every day of the season. Well, perhaps not every day, but those 60 home runs he hit were like ballistic missiles launched from a submerged submarine. Raleigh was a close runner-up for the American League's MVP award, but all he did was set a MLB record for homers in a season by a catcher, a switch hitter, and the Mariners franchise. The first time All Star was third in the majors with 125 RBI, fourth in slugging percentage (.589) and fifth in OPS (.948). His defense was on a par with any Gold Glove receiver...For practically the entire year, the M's jostled for position with the Astros for the AL West division top spot. A 17-4 winning skein (including a three-game sweep of Houston) from September 6<sup>th</sup> to the end of the regular season was the impetus the ball club needed to pick up the division flag. Two trade deadline acquisitions, Josh Naylor and the second go-around for Eugenio Suarez, were a huge bonus. The duo combined for 22 home runs and 64 RBI with Seattle. Julio Rodriguez added 32 bombs and 95 RBI. Jorge Polanco popped 26 homers...Starter Bryan Woo won 15 ballgames and struck out 198 to lead the pitching corps. Closer Andres Munoz finished third among big leaguers in saves...In an AL Division series against Detroit, the M's had to work from behind to advance, winning three games to two. Likewise, the ALCS was a battle to the end with Toronto before the Blue Jays prevailed in seven games...Ichiro Suzuki's number 51 was retired August 8<sup>th</sup>...Former Mariners backstop and now manager, Dan Wilson, was third in Manager of the Year voting.
