The Phightin' Phillies were NL East front-runners for most of the season but they had to give chase to the Mets to conquer the division. A 5 ½ game deficit on June 12th saw the ball club begin to make a move for the top spot as the Mets started a precipitous downward spiral. On June 20th, the Phillies finally took sole possession of first place. From there, they kept up their winning ways, finishing the remainder of the schedule 57-37 (.606), while the New Yorkers were flailing away (38-54). From that deficit on June 12th, the Phillies won the division by 13 games. Even though the team was in a great race with the Mets, Phillies phollowers still weren't satisfied with the managerial acumen of Rob Thomson. That feeling persisted to the end of the year as the Phils were eliminated from the post-season, being discharged by the Dodgers three games to one in a best-of-five Division Series. However, Thomson wasn't going anywhere for the time being...Ahh, the Phillies could mash the baseball. Start with Kyle Schwarber who ended the year second in the majors with 56 bombs and the big league RBI king with 132. Philadelphia was among the best hitting teams. They tied the Brewers for second place (.258) right behind the Blue Jays who hit an eye-popping .265. A lot of that batting prowess came from the stick of Trea Turner who finished no lower than eighth in these categories: Batting average (6th); base hits (179, tie for 4th); triples (7, tie for 8th); and stolen bases (8th). Schwarber shell-soaked big league pitching for a .563 slugging percentage and .928 OPS. Bryce Harper added 27 home runs, 75 RBI. The pitching staff had one of the lowest ERAs in the majors (3.79). There were four double-digit winners: Lefties Jesus Luzardo (15), Cristopher Sanchez (13), and Ranger Suarez (12). Righty Zack Wheeler won 10 ballgames. The quartet combined for 50 wins (only 25 losses), 692.2 innings pitched, 237 earned runs, and 774 strikeouts. A 3.08 ERA is pretty hard to beat nowadays. Luzardo was ranked fourth in the big leagues with 216 strikeouts (10.584 per nine innings). Sanchez was seventh in K's (212), fifth in ERA (2.50).
