With the exception of six days in April, the Yankees owned the American League East into July. The Toronto Blue Jays would make it a ding-dong race, finally tying the Bronx Bombers for first July 2nd after the Yankees lost in Toronto, 11-9. New York relinquished the lead to the Blue Jays the following day, losing 8-5. The Yanks biggest lead had been seven games on May 28th; however, the Jays came on strong, going 50-30 May-June-July while New York was 42-36. Toronto would lead by as many as 6 ½ games July 26th and as late as August 23rd. The two rivals played evenly through August with the Yankees dropping to third place, August 28th. When the Yanks beat the White Sox, 8-1, September 24th, they retied the Jays for first place. They remained tied to the end of the regular schedule. Toronto became division champion due to a tie-breaker. Instead of a one-game winner take all, the Jays won the crown since they had beaten New York in their season series, eight games to five...New York eliminated Boston win their AL Wild Card series, three games to two before the Yankees and Blue Jays collided again in a Division Series. The Yanks were swept away, four games to none to end the year...The Yankees as a team led the big leagues with 274 homers. League MVP Aaron Judge walloped 53 round-trippers in this go-around. He led the league in runs scored (137) and the majors in batting average along with a slash of .457/.688/1.144. Trent Grisham hit an unexpected 34 home runs as well as "Jazz" Chisholm (31). Giancarlo Stanton crushed 24 homers in 77 games...Two starters at the top of the pitching staff, Carlos Rodon (18 wins) and Max Fried (19-5) were consistently superb all season. Rodon led the staff in strikeouts (203) while Fried topped the majors in wins and winning percentage (.792). Fried whiffed 189 batters. Devin Williams, acquired from the Brewers to be the closer, struggled mightily most of the year before righting himself. David Bednar joined the team after a deal with the Pirates, becoming a huge asset in the bullpen...Jorbit Rivas' name is pronounced JOR-beet BEE-bas.
